Subject: Resolution to Baltimore City Ransomware Attack

On Friday afternoon, May 17, 2019, the Mayor of Baltimore issued the following press release:

Please carefully review the introduction to the press release and the section at the bottom under "REAL ESTATE TRANSACTIONS".

Essentially, the City will begin accepting requests for lien certificates <u>in person</u> at the Municipal Building located at 200 N. Holliday Street, in Room 1, starting on May 20, 2019, from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. These hours will last for the week of May 20. The property seller/transferor will be required to sign an affidavit affirming their obligation to pay outstanding charges within 10 days of receipt of an invoice from the City.

Most importantly, from a title insurance perspective, signing the affidavit will remove responsibility by the new property owner for property debts or liens of the seller/transferor.
